Keynote Speaker:

Rishi Manchanda, MD, MPH
CEO of HealthBegins

Dr. Rishi Manchanda is CEO at HealthBegins, a national mission-driven consulting and training firm that helps clients and partners transform the social and structural drivers of health equity. He has developed and scaled novel strategies to improve health equity and justice for historically marginalized communities throughout his career. He has served as director of social medicine for a network of community health centers in South-Central Los Angeles, as the lead primary care physician for homeless veterans at the Greater Los Angeles VA, and as chief medical officer for a self-insured employer with a large rural immigrant workforce. In his 2013 book, *The Upstream Doctors*, and a 2014 TED Talk, he introduced "Upstreamists," a new model of healthcare professionals who improve care by helping health systems address the social and structural drivers of health equity—patients' social needs (e.g. food insecurity and housing stability), community-level social determinants of health, and structural determinants of health equity including structural racism.
