ALERT There has been a rise in issues related to permanent residency within campgrounds. Please be aware, MCL 333.12501a, Section 12501 of Act 368, defines a campground, in part, as "a parcel or tract of land under the control of a person in which sites are offered for the use of the public or members of an organization, either free of charge or for a fee, for the establishment of temporary living quarters..." Please see the enclosed letter from the Enforcement Unit for further details.

As EGLE transitions to electronic submissions, we strongly encourage Campground Owners to create a MiLogin for Business account and then **request an account to MiEHDWIS**. The system allows users to submit documents directly to EGLE for review as well as has direct messaging to EGLE staff right on a submission activity. Coming next year, there will be the ability to pay for invoices and view license and permit documents as soon as they are issued by EGLE. SUBJECT: Permanent Residency in Campgrounds

Recently, the Department of Environment, Great Lakes, and Energy's (EGLE) Drinking Water and Environmental Health Division (DWEHD) received reports of individuals allegedly residing in licensed campgrounds on a year-round or permanent basis. As a reminder, campgrounds in the state of Michigan are regulated under Part 125, Campgrounds, Public Health Code, 1978 PA 368, as amended (Act 368), and the administrative rules promulgated under Part 125 (R 325.1551 to R 325.1599).

MCL 333.12501a, Section 12501 of Act 368, defines a campground, in part, as "a parcel or tract of land under the control of a person in which sites are offered for the use of the public or members of an organization, either free of charge or for a fee, for the establishment of **temporary** living quarters…"

Since campgrounds are only intended to be used as temporary living quarters, it is unlawful to reside in a campground on a permanent or long-term basis. Please be advised that the presence of permanent residents in a campground is grounds for EGLE to revoke or deny renewal of that campground's license to operate. Without a current license, any use of the campground constitutes illegal operation under Part 125 of Act 368.

MCL 333.12506(1), Section 12506 of Act 368 states in part, "A person shall not operate a campground without a campground license issued by the department, its agency or representative, or a representative of a designated local health department."

R 333.12516 of the administrative rules promulgated under Part 125 of Act 368 states:

- "(1) A person who violates sections 12501 to 12515 is guilty of a misdemeanor.
- (2) Notwithstanding the existence of any other remedy, the department, its agent or representative, or a representative of a designated local health department may maintain an action in the name of the state for an injunction against a person to restrain or prevent the construction, enlargement, or alteration of a campground without a permit, or the operation or conduct of a campground without a license."

SUBJECT: Permanent Residency in Campgrounds

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Please be further advised that continued operation of a campground whose license is not renewed or has been revoked may result in escalated enforcement action by EGLE, including, but not limited to criminal charges, injunction, or other criminal or civil penalties.

EGLE will be releasing further guidance on permanent residency, but as a general guideline, one or more of the following may be determined to be permanent residency for purposes of enforcement:

- Rents received/individual(s) occupying the campground for 180 days or more in a calendar year.
- Driver's license listing campground address as home address.
- Receiving bills or other mail at the campground address.
- Voter registration listing the campground as home address.
- Children enrolled in local school district/school bus service being provided to the campground.
- Establishment of utility services such as phone or internet to the campsite.

The above list is not all-inclusive. Likewise, the presence of one of these factors (with the exception of 180-day occupancy) does not necessarily indicate permanent residency. For instance, a seasonal resident may have mail temporarily forwarded to the campsite for a period of time without being considered a permanent resident. Please note that this notice applies only to EGLE campground licensure. Campgrounds and permanent residents may also be subject to other considerations such as zoning, fire code, tax implications, and building codes, among others. Please refer to the coming guidance for more information.
