The MDHHS Child and Adolescent Heath Center program has released <u>two</u> Requests for Proposals to establish new programs in one of three models: Child and Adolescent Health Centers (CAHC), School Wellness programs (SWP), and Expanding, Enhancing Emotional Health (E3). Following are two press releases for these opportunities.

There are separate RFPs announcements for $\underline{E3}$ and the $\underline{CAHC/SWP}$ models. Interested eligible parties may apply for up to two $\underline{E3}$ and two \underline{CAHC} or \underline{SWP} respectively.

Grant applications must be submitted electronically through the MI E-Grants program by **3 p.m.** on Friday, April **15**, **2022**. The first-year program period begins June **1**, 2022 and ends Sept. **30**, 2022, with annual renewals for based on availability of funds and acceptable performance. A pre-application conference will be held to discuss this funding opportunity and provide instruction on using the EGrAMS system. Please find the attached funding announcement from MPHI. Up to 14 awards will be made to for June 2022 through May 2023, with a base level of \$250,000 to a maximum of \$675,000 per award.

This opportunity is seeking organizations with established connections to act as a backbone organization (BBO) and convener to support the formation of a regional health equity council made up of community organizations serving populations disproportionately impacted by COVID-19. Successful applicants will demonstrate experience working in with one or more of Michigan's racial and ethnic minority populations: Black/African American, American Indian/Alaskan Native, Arab and Chaldean American, Asian American, and Pacific Islanders, and Hispanic/Latinos. The goal of this approach is to ensure the organizations best situated to meet the needs of Michigan's racial and ethnic minority populations receive funding to implement community identified and defined strategies.

The BBO will support their regional health equity council in accomplishing five (5) key goals:

- A reduction in COVID-19 disparities in impacted communities specifically among Michigan's five racial and ethnic minority populations
- Planned reduction of community identified priority risk factors

- Development and implementation of practices and policies to promote equity and reduce health disparities
- Equitable distribution and efficient use of resources to support affected communities, including organizations, and community leaders, both existing and emerging
- Community driven, not agency driven, decision making and priority setting

This initiative will engage a BBO to support each of the following fourteen (14) regions where the majority of Michigan's racial and ethnic minority populations reside and are highly impacted by COVID-19:
