# U.S. Entry, Immigration Status, and Benefit Eligibility

- 1. Ukrainian newcomers entering the U.S. through the <u>Uniting 4 Ukraine</u> (U4U) program are given Humanitarian Parole (UHP) <sup>1</sup> status.
- 2. Ukrainian newcomers have entered through the Mexican border (prior to U4U); most were paroled (UHP) <sup>1</sup>.
- 3. Ukrainian newcomers are arriving with other visa types; some are applying for TPS. <sup>2</sup>
- 4. Very few will continue to arrive through the typical U.S. Reception and Placement (USRAP) pathway as Refugees, although these numbers may increase over time.

# Arrival Data<sup>3</sup>

- 31,814 UHPs have entered the U.S. through the U4U program.
- The State receives data from the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) regarding the number of applications submitted to participate in U4U (Table 1).
  - o 2,558 applications were submitted in Michigan.
  - O Numbers do not necessarily indicate the number of Ukrainians approved to travel to the U.S., and not necessarily the number of Ukrainians intending to live in that county. Data does not include those who entered through points 2-4 above.
  - o 3% of U.S.-supporter applications came from Michigan (10<sup>th</sup> highest state).

### Health Requirements (U4U) & Recommendations (All Ukrainian Newcomers)

- Ukrainians participating in the U4U program have the following health requirements:<sup>4</sup>
  - o Prior to U.S. entry -- Complete a vaccine attestation (MMR, IPV, COVID-19)
  - o Within 90 days of U.S. arrival -- Complete a medical screening attestation:
    - IGRA (Interferon-Gamma Release Assay) TB blood test
    - Vaccinations (MMR, IPV, COVID-19)
- Failure to comply with health requirements can lead to termination of parole, detention, and removal from the U.S.
- Ukrainian newcomers who entered the U.S. through points 2 and 3 above currently do not have to meet health requirements. However, we recommend all Ukrainian newcomers, regardless of how they entered the U.S., participate in TB testing and vaccination.

# **Refugee Medical Screening**

- UHPs are eligible to receive a refugee medical screening (RMS). This is a <u>comprehensive</u> medical exam that is covered by Medicaid and federal funding; the exam includes TB screening and vaccinations.
- The State contracts with six refugee health clinics to provide RMS for all eligible newcomers (Table 2).
  - Clinics are experienced in determining benefit eligibility, guiding clients through benefit applications, and working with newcomer populations.
  - The State highly recommends UHPs are referred to Refugee Clinics for benefit support and medical screening.
